Non-GAAP Financial Measures

The discussion in this presentation and the associated conference call of The Hanover's financial performance includes reference to certain financial measures that are not derived from generally accepted accounting principles, or GAAP, such as operating income, operating income before taxes (and interest expense), combined ratios and loss ratios, excluding catastrophes and/or prior-year development and accident year loss ratios, excluding catastrophes. A reconciliation of non-GAAP measures to the closest GAAP measure is included in the end notes to this presentation, the press release dated July 31, 2019 or the financial supplement, which are posted on our website. The reconciliation of current accident year loss ratio and combined ratio excluding catastrophes to the most directly comparable GAAP measure, total loss ratio and combined ratio, is found in the end notes on the final pages of this document. Operating income (operating income per diluted share) is a non-GAAP measure. It is defined as net income excluding the after-tax impact of net realized and unrealized investment gains and losses, as well as results from discontinued operations divided by, in the case of per share reported figures, the average number of diluted shares of common stock. In referral to one of the company's three segments, operating income is segment income before taxes.

Operating return on equity ("ROE") and adjusted operating ROE are non-GAAP measures. See end note (6) for a detailed explanation of how these measures are calculated. Operating ROE is based on non-GAAP operating income, and adjusted operating ROE is a measure of operating income as a return on only that portion of shareholders' equity attributable to the continuing operations. For measurement periods prior to the close of the Chaucer transaction, which occurred on December 28, 2018, "equity attributable to Chaucer", which was reported as discontinued operations, is excluded. For measurement periods post-closing, "the undeployed equity", and related net investment income, is excluded. This eliminates the dilutive impact of any excess capital that would have been included in shareholders' equity and net investment income included in operating income for the corresponding periods presented. In addition, the portion of shareholder equity attributed to unrealized appreciation (depreciation) on fixed maturity investments, net of tax, is also excluded. The company believes that these measures are helpful to investors and financial analysts in that they provide insight to the capital used by, and results of, continuing operations exclusive of interest, taxes and other non-operating items, and, in the case of "adjusted operating ROE", undeployed equity attributable to Chaucer. These measures should not be construed as substitutes for GAAP ROE, which is based on net income and shareholders' equity of the entire company and without adjustments. The definition of other financial measures and terms can be found in the 2018 Annual Report on pages 72-74.



Second Quarter 2019

Net Income and Operating Income⁽¹⁾ of \$1.79 and \$1.88 per Diluted Share, Respectively; Combined Ratio of 96.1%; Combined Ratio, Excluding Catastrophes⁽²⁾, of 90.7%

- Net premiums written increase of 4.0%*, which reflects growth in more profitable segments, partially offset by the continued execution of profit improvement initiatives
- Continued price increases in Core Commercial Lines⁽³⁾ of 6.4% and 5.0% in Personal Lines⁽⁴⁾
- Catastrophe losses of \$59.6 million, or 5.4 points, including current year losses of \$66.6 million, or 6.0 points, and favorable development on prior-year catastrophes of \$7.0 million, or 0.6 points
- Net investment income of \$69.6 million, up 6.1% from the prior-year quarter, driven by the investment of increased cash flows from operations and remaining undeployed equity from the sale of Chaucer
- Announced \$150 million accelerated share repurchase (“ASR”) program at the end of June, after the completion of the prior \$250 million ASR program announced at the end of 2018
- Book value per share of \$74.39, up 3.4% from March 31, 2019

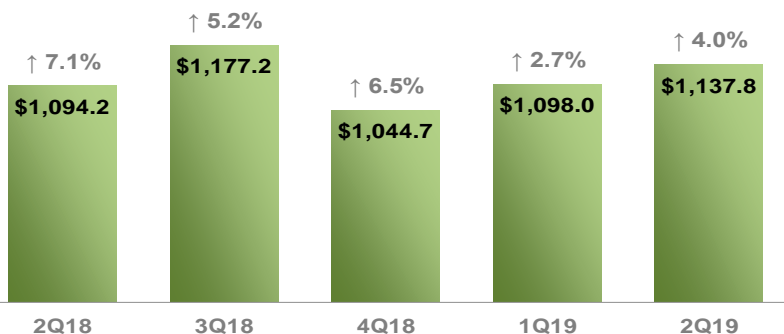

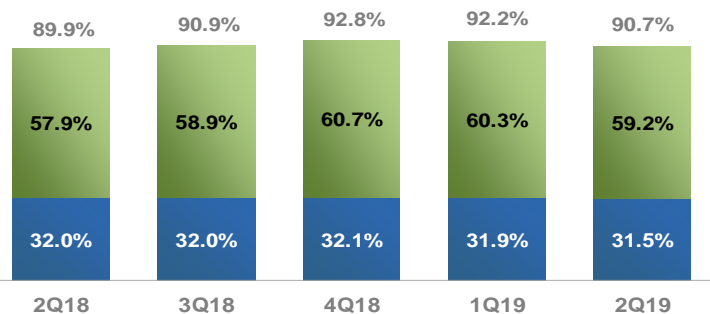

Current Accident Year Combined Ratio, Ex-Cat



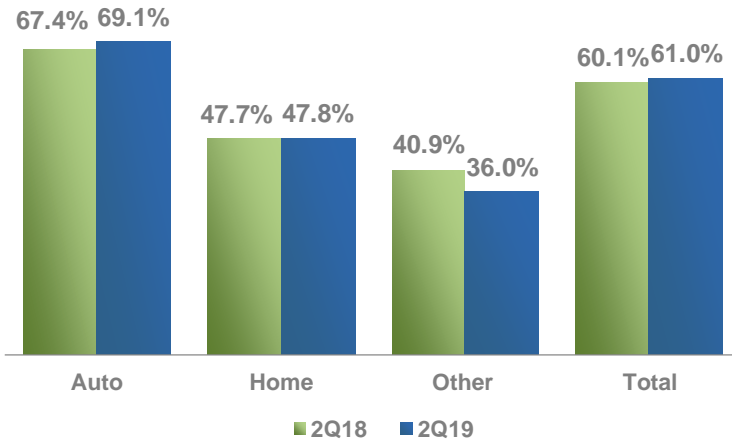
- Combined ratio of 96.1%, including:
 - 5.4 points of catastrophe losses
 - Current accident year catastrophe loss ratio of 6.0%
 - \$7.0 million, or 0.6 points, of favorable prior-year catastrophe reserve development
 - Favorable ex-cat prior-year reserve development in Workers' Compensation largely offset by unfavorable development in Personal and Commercial Auto
- Current accident year combined ratio, ex-cat, of 90.7% increased 0.8 points over the prior-year quarter:
 - Current accident year loss and LAE ratio, ex-cats, of 59.2% increased 1.3 points over the prior-year quarter, driven by:
 - The timing of 2018 loss selections
 - Large loss activity in marine business
 - Expense ratio of 31.5% improved 0.5 points over the prior-year quarter, primarily due to fixed cost leverage from premium growth and timing of certain expenses
- Top-line growth of 4.0%, driven by:
 - Strong growth in most profitable businesses
 - Partially offset by continued execution on profit improvement initiatives
 - Growth of 5.7%, excluding these initiatives⁽⁹⁾

Expense ratio⁽⁷⁾ Current accident year loss and LAE ratio, ex-cat⁽⁸⁾

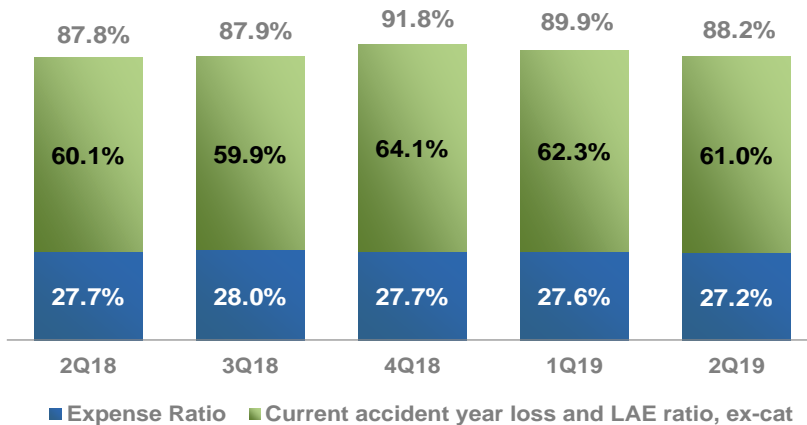

Current Accident Year Combined Ratio, Ex-Cat



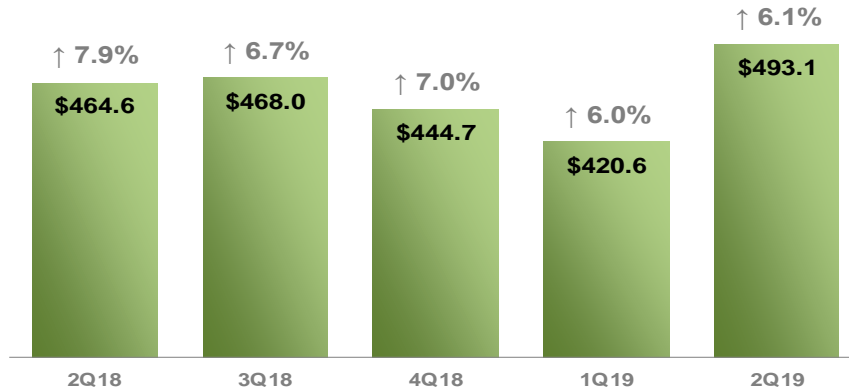

- Current accident year combined ratio, ex-cat, of 88.2% increased 0.4 points over the prior-year quarter:
 - Current accident year loss and LAE ratio, ex-cats, increased to 61.0%, driven by:
 - Personal Auto
 - Timing of 2018 loss selections
 - Continued cautious view of Auto bodily injury coverages in light of unfavorable development
 - Homeowners was in-line with prior-year quarter
 - Expense ratio improved 0.5 points to 27.2%

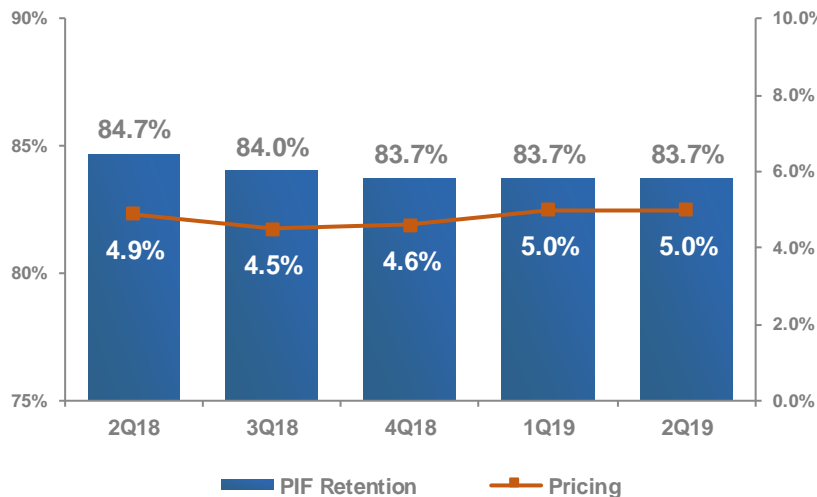

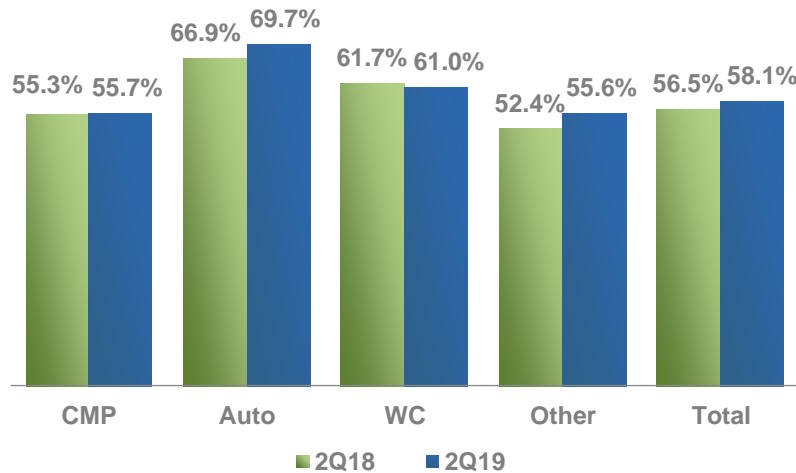

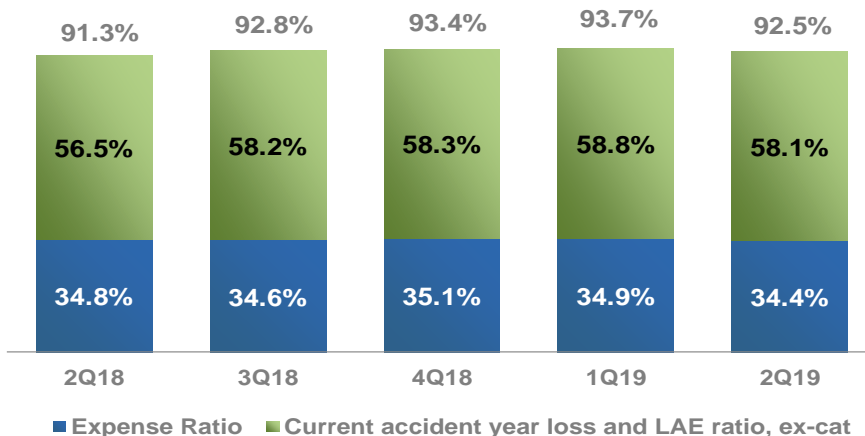

Current Accident Year Combined Ratio, Ex-Cat

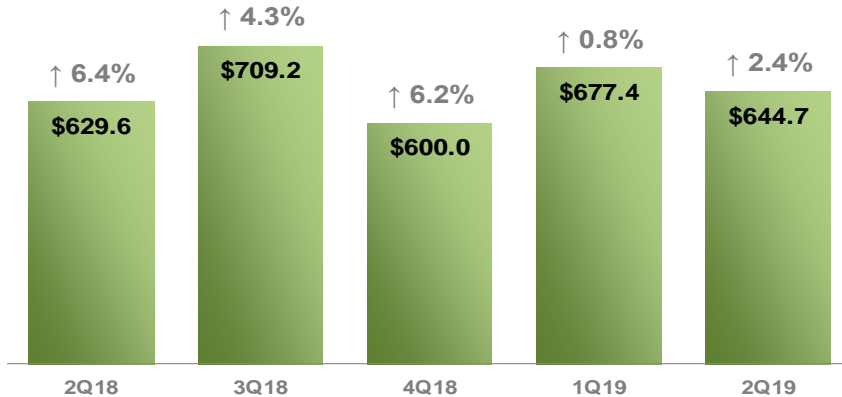


- Combined ratio of 95.4%, including catastrophe losses of 3.5 points
- Favorable ex-cat prior-year reserve development of \$4.0 million, or 0.6 points, driven by:
 - Favorable development in Workers' Compensation and Commercial Multiple Peril liability
 - Partially offset by reserve increases in Commercial Auto and Other Commercial Lines
- Current accident year combined ratio, ex-cat, of 92.5% increased 1.2 points from the prior-year quarter:
 - Current accident year loss and LAE ratio, excluding catastrophes, increased to 58.1%, driven by:
 - Other Commercial lines, due to large loss activity in Marine
 - Commercial Auto, due to timing of loss selection increase in 2018
 - Expense ratio improved 0.4 points to 34.4%

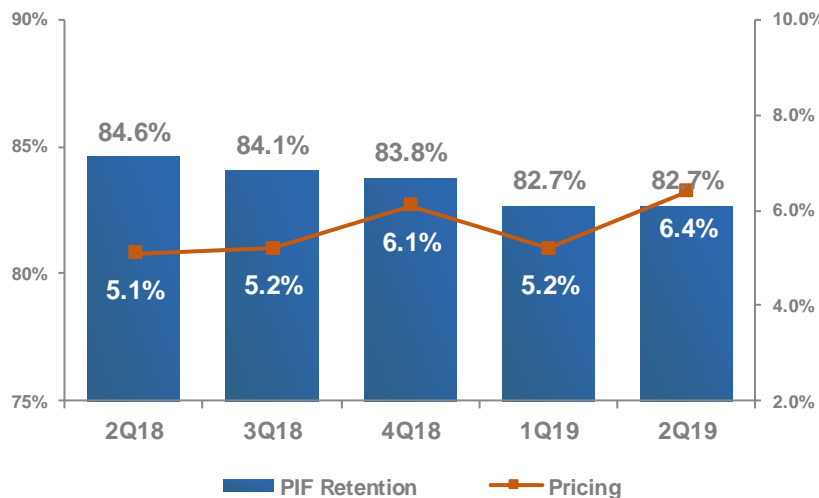

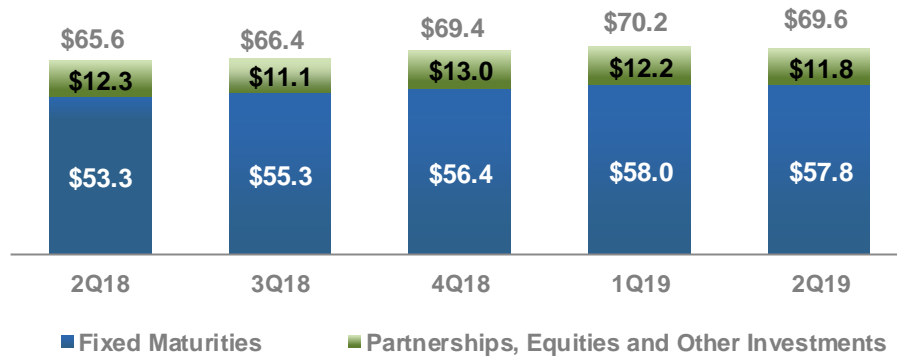

(\$ in millions)

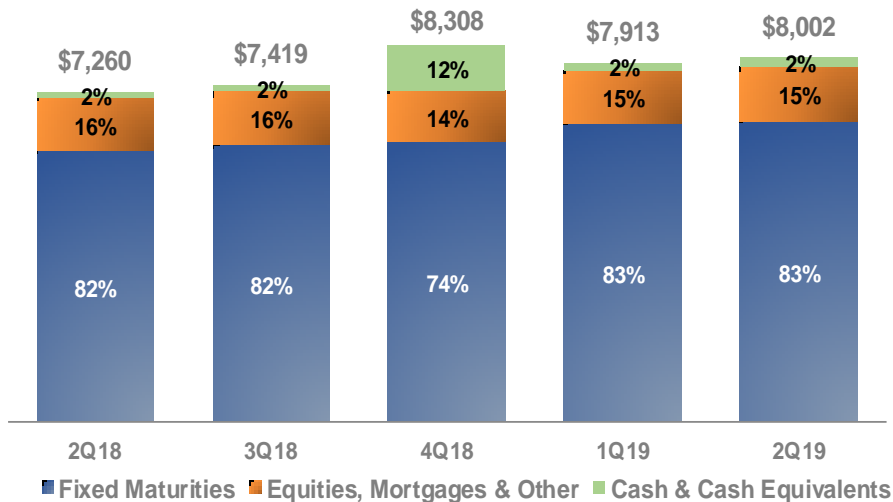

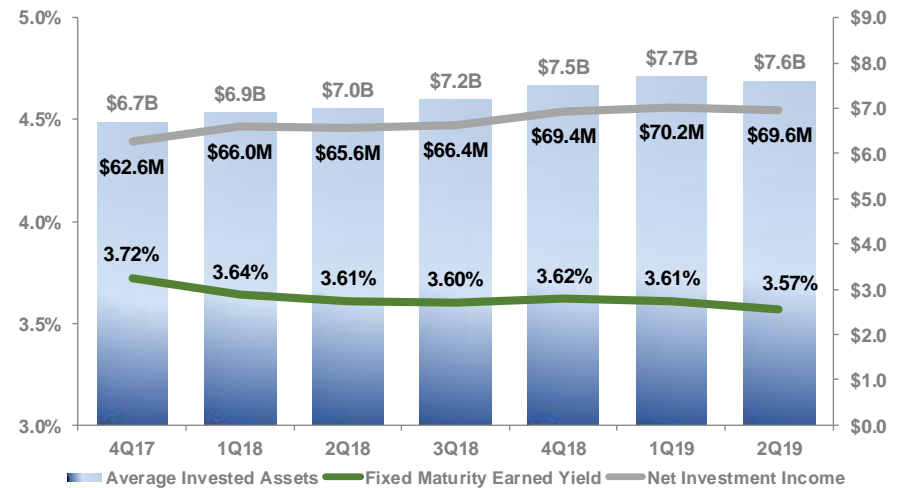

Investment Portfolio Trends

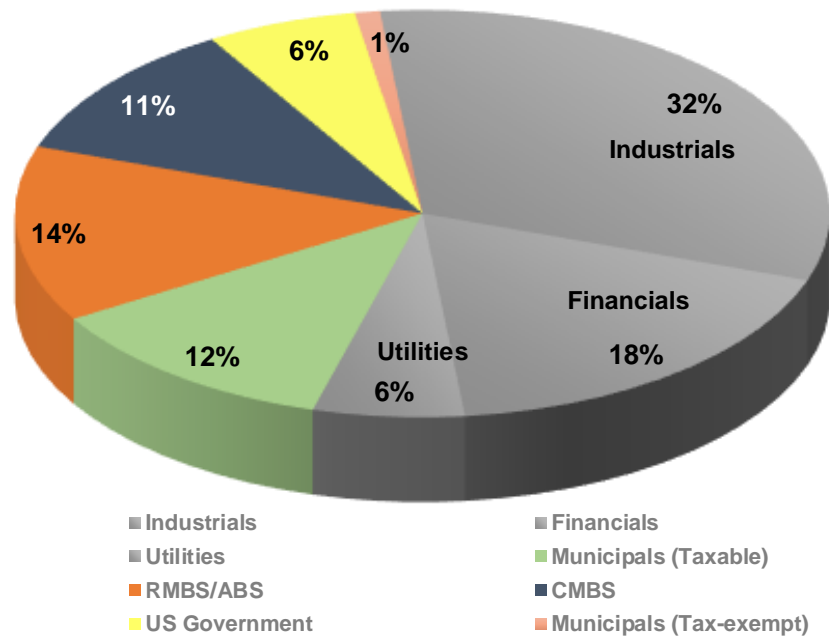

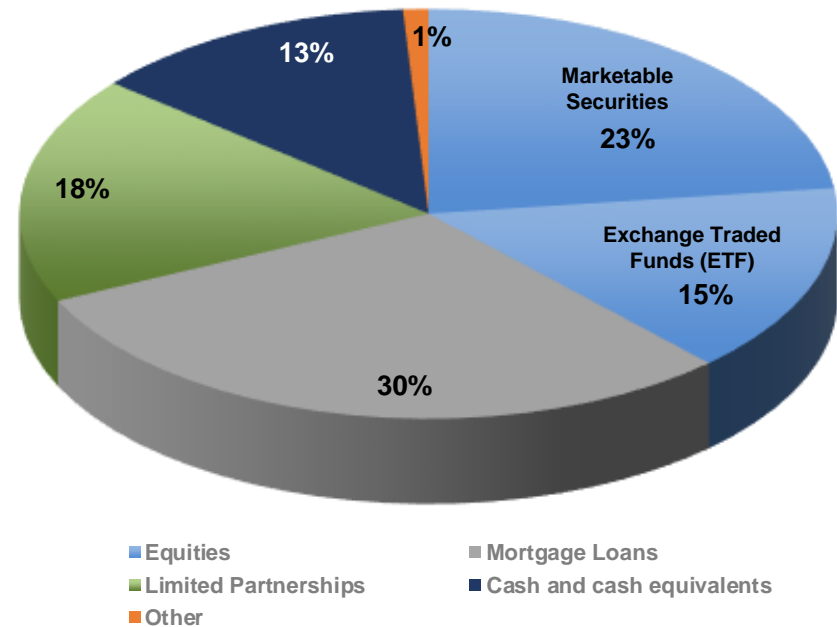


Investment Portfolio Holdings – Total Invested Assets \$8.0B at June 30, 2019

*Under the terms of the ASR, the full payment of \$150 million was made on June 28, 2019, in conjunction with the delivery of approximately 80% of the shares initially expected to be repurchased. The remaining shares will be delivered before the end of the October 2019. The timing of this second delivery causes additional dilution beyond what is expected under a normal share repurchase. The \$(0.45) impact is an estimate based on the initially expected total number of shares and assumes that the number of shares delivered before the end of October will be equal to 20% of the total shares received under the ASR. The actual impact will be dependent on the actual number of shares delivered.

(3) Core Commercial business provides commercial property and casualty coverages to small and mid-sized businesses in the U.S., generally with annual premiums per policy up to \$250,000, primarily through the commercial multiple peril, commercial auto and workers' compensation lines of business, as reported on the current quarter financial supplement. Price increases in Commercial Lines and Core Commercial Lines represent the average change in premium on renewed policies caused by the estimated net effect of base rate changes, discretionary pricing, inflation or changes in policy level exposure or insured risks.
